We're required by law to meet New Zealand's International and Domestic Pastoral Care Code, (the Code) which applies to all registered tertiary providers across the country. This is administered and monitored by the New Zealand Qualifications Authority (NZQA).

An updated Code came into effect in January 2022 which mandates one set of clear rules and expectations for embedding safety and wellbeing into systems and day-to-day practices – tailored to learners' needs.

Here's a summary of the Code as it relates to international students.

Tertiary providers should ensure international students:

- are protected and supported from when they leave their home country, to when they finish their education journey
- are aware of their rights and protections
- feel safe and happy while studying in New Zealand
- are provided correct information through agents, who act professionally
- are aware of the terms and conditions of their enrolment.


Criteria that must be applied: The listed outcomes represent the minimum scores or grades for each test or qualification that qualify a student for enrolment at each programme level.

- Students with higher scores or grades than required for a particular programme level may still enrol at that level.
- Where the entry requirements for a programme are for a higher English proficiency outcome than is listed in the relevant row of the Table for the programme level in which the student is being enrolled, the student must meet that higher level.
- All test scores must be from a single report except:
- TOEFL iBT where the test scores must be from a single report for a single test date, and the My Best Scores option must not be used
- LanguageCert where the test scores must be from a single report for Written (LRW) and a separate individual report for Spoken (S).

Qualification levels



The New Zealand Qualifications Framework (NZQF) is comprised of ten levels and covers a range of qualifications from certificates to doctoral degrees. The levels are based on how complex the learning is; with one being the most basic, through to ten being the most complex.

Preparation and arrival in New Zealand

Arriving in New Zealand

If requested in advance, Toi Ohomai | Te Pūkenga can arrange to have you picked up from the Auckland, Rotorua or Tauranga airports. International Centre staff will also meet you at your orientation day and will provide all the information you will need to begin your study and settle in to campus life at Rotorua or Tauranga.

Money

- Travel with only a small amount of cash
- Bring traveller's cheques and a credit card to cover your initial expenses
- Open a New Zealand bank account as soon as possible after your arrival

Immigration and student visas

If you are going to study in New Zealand for more than 12 weeks, you will need to apply for a student visa. Check out immigration.govt.nz.

Medical and travel insurance

International students must have appropriate and current medical and travel insurance while in New Zealand, and this usually costs no more than \$700 per academic year.

Uni-Care is our preferred insurance provider. It is important to understand the inclusions stated in the New Zealand Student Plan (visit uni-care.org).

Eligibility for health services

Most international students are not entitled to subsidised health services. If you receive medical treatment while in New Zealand, you may be required to pay the full cost of that treatment. More details are available through the Ministry of Health at health.govt.nz.

Accident insurance

The Accident Compensation Corporation (ACC) provides accident insurance for all temporary visitors to New Zealand, but you may still be required to pay for some or all other medical and related costs. More details are available at acc.co.nz.

Accommodation

Toi Ohomai | Te Pūkenga can help arrange accommodation while you are here for your studies. For all the latest information, visit the Accommodation page on our website, under the Student Services tab.

Shared accommodation (Tauranga)

Toi Ohomai | Te Pūkenga offers rental houses close to Windermere Campus. The bedrooms are lockable and furnished. Living areas and bathrooms are shared with at least one other student. These houses contain essential cooking utensils, crockery and appliances, a washing machine, fridge/freezer and television.

Homestay

We recommend living in a homestay option, especially if you are studying English and want to be able to practise your English with your host family. The family environment can also ease the adjustment of living in a new country as you experience different food, language and customs. We recommend you commit to staying at least one month with your homestay family while you adjust to life in Rotorua or Tauranga and while you and your homestay family get used to each other.

The homestay fee includes your own room, power, and access to kitchen, bathroom and laundry facilities - it may also include internet access. Extra charges apply if you are under 18 years old.

The weekly homestay fee is NZ\$230-\$290 including food, or \$170-\$190 without food.



Flatting (sharing a house)

If you plan to live in a rented house or apartment with one or more people, we call that "flatting". You and your flatmates will be responsible for finding your own furniture, bedding, cooking utensils and other household necessities. You can find all of these new items at shops in town or, to keep costs down, you can buy from second-hand shops or online (e.g. Trade Me).

You will need to share the cost of power and other bills, cook your meals, do your own laundry and your share of household cleaning, and abide by the rental agreement.

It can take some time to find a flat to rent and you may need to stay in temporary accommodation for the first month after arriving in New Zealand. This is where short-term shared accommodation or a homestay option would be desirable.

Basic expenses

- Rents for students in our area range from NZD\$180-\$280 per week; this includes power and water.
- Groceries for one person costs approximately NZD\$80-\$130 per week.
- Allow for general expenses of NZD\$50-\$120 per week.

These figures are approximate and may vary.

Accommodation for families

Most of the accommodation providers Toi Ohomai works with are set up to host individual students only; few can accept a family or couple.

If you plan to bring your family, we strongly recommend that you come to New Zealand on your own first and arrive a couple of weeks before our orientation programme. Arriving early will give you time to look for long-term family accommodation in the private housing market.

If your family comes with you, you may need to stay in a hotel or motel while you try to find long-term accommodation. This can be very expensive.
